RESOLUTION #20-115

RESOLUTION CELEBRATING THE MONTH OF FEBRUARY AS NATIONAL BLACK HISTORY MONTH

WHEREAS, in 1926, Dr. Carter G. Woodson, the second African-American to earn a Ph.D. from Harvard, established the observance of Negro History Week in order to promote the contributions and achievements of African-American people in the development of our American democracy. Dr. Woodson timed such week to coincide with the birthdays of both Frederick Douglass and President Abraham Lincoln; and **WHEREAS**, the organization founded by Dr. Woodson, now known as the Association for the Study of African American Life and History, was instrumental in effecting the first official recognition of National Black History Month by President Gerald Ford in 1976; and

WHEREAS, every American president since the mid-1970's has issued proclamations endorsing the Association's theme for National Black History Month; and

WHEREAS, the theme of this year's observance of National Black History Month is "African Americans and the Vote", as the year 2020 marks the 150th anniversary of the Fifteenth Amendment, ratified in 1870, which gave black men the right to vote, and the 100th anniversary of the 19th Amendment, ratified in 1920, which gave all women, regardless of color, the right to vote; and

WHEREAS, in our continued efforts to live up to the American values of freedom and justice for all people, it is important to highlight the work and courage of bold individuals who were willing to change the status quo; and

WHEREAS, New Jersey was home to some such bold individuals. In 1840, the town of Lawnside in Camden County became the first independent, self-governing black municipality north of the Mason-Dixon Line; and

WHEREAS, Reverend Peter Mott was a preacher, farmer and Underground Railroad conductor whose Lawnside, New Jersey home, built circa 1845, was an important Underground Railroad station and is now a museum known as the Peter Mott House; and

WHEREAS, the abolitionist and political activist, Harriet Tubman, lived and worked in Cape May, New Jersey, where the opening of the Tubman Museum is planned for this year, which marks the 200th anniversary of Tubman's birth; and

WHEREAS, African-American leadership in the movements for equal rights, women's suffrage, civil rights and voting rights, has created a more equal and just society for us all.

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Borough of Chatham joins in recognizing the annual celebration of National Black History Month and commemorates the contributions of African Americans from America's beginning, to our American economy, society, culture, freedoms and values.

WHEREAS, National Nutrition Month[®] is a nutrition education and information campaign created annually in March by the Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics to focus attention on the importance of making informed food choices and developing sound eating and physical activity habits; and

WHEREAS, National Nutrition Month[®] encourages us to achieve the numerous benefits healthy eating habits offer, but it also urges us to find ways to cut back on food waste; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor's Wellness Advisory Committee was established to work with Mayors and key leaders to promote healthy behaviors and shape healthier lifestyles for the men, women and children in their communities, and

WHEREAS, the Mayor's Wellness Advisory Committee recognizes that food is the substance by which life is sustained and the type, quality, and amount of food that individuals consume each day plays a vital role in their overall health and physical fitness; and

WHEREAS, there is a need for continuing nutrition education and a wide-scale effort to encourage healthy eating practices.

RESOLUTION ACKNOWLEDGING THE THIRD WEEK OF MARCH AS NATIONAL POISON PREVENTION WEEK

WHEREAS, Congress designated the third full week in March to be National Poison Prevention Week (NPPW) in 1961 and since then this week has helped to raise national awareness of the dangers of potentially dangerous medicines, household products and chemicals, environmental contaminants, and other substances; and

WHEREAS, poison centers across the country will focus the public's attention on the free, lifesaving services provided by poison centers, as well as, educating the public on ways to prevent poisoning exposures; and

WHEREAS, the New Jersey Poison Control Center, a division of the Department of Emergency Medicine at Rutgers New Jersey Medical School provides 24/7 expert poisoning treatment advice, drug information, and prevention education at no cost to the public accessing center services through the Poison Help number at 1-800-222-1222, chat (<u>www.njpies.org</u>), or text 973-339-0712; and

WHEREAS, specialized medical professionals (doctors, pharmacists, and nurses) provide accessible, free, and confidential healthcare to all; and

WHEREAS, poison center services save healthcare dollars by eliminating thousands of unnecessary emergency department/room visits and decreasing lengths of stays for patients hospitalized for poisoning through telemedicine services/capabilities; and

WHEREAS, the poison center is instrumental in the surveillance and management of poisoning exposures across the state, including the use, misuse, and abuse of; medications, legal and illicit drugs, environmental contaminants, bioterrorism agents, and common household products and chemicals; and

WHEREAS, the state's poison control center is involved in New Jersey's efforts in homeland defense, counterterrorism, emergency preparedness and response, and bio-surveillance; and

WHEREAS, unintentional poisoning is the leading cause of unintentional injury death in New Jersey outnumbering deaths by motor vehicles and firearms; and

WHEREAS, a poison is defined as anything that can cause harm if taken in the wrong amount, in the wrong way or by the wrong person; and

WHEREAS, although most reported poison exposures involve children five (5) years old and younger; most poisoning deaths occur in adults aged 20 to 59; and

WHEREAS, overdose deaths from prescription opioids, over-the-counter medications, and illegal drugs remain at epidemic proportions for both New Jersey and the United States; and

WHEREAS, lead exposure and carbon monoxide (CO) poisoning remain major public health concerns; and

WHEREAS, vaping and e-cigarette devices pose a serious risk of nicotine poisoning, as well as serious potentially deadly vaping associated lung illnesses, also referred to as EVALI; and

WHEREAS, poison center experts encourage the public not to guess, wait for symptoms, or waste time looking up medical information online when potential poisoning exposures occur; and

WHEREAS, all residents should save the Poison Control Center's number, 1-800-222-1222, in their cell, home, and office phones because a fast response can make all the difference in preventing serious injury and saving lives.

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Chatham do hereby proclaim the week of March 15-21, 2020 as National Poison Prevention Week in Chatham Borough and encourage all citizens to pledge their commitment to ensuring the safety of themselves, their families, and their community.

Council Member Resto moved to approve Resolution # 20-118, seconded by Council Member Weber. By a unanimous voice vote, Resolution # 20-118 was approved.

DISCUSSION ITEMS

Library Construction Project – Ms. Karen Brodsky, Director of the Library of the Chathams and Mr. Andrew Hollander, President for the Board of Trustees of the Library came forward to discuss the library's plan to execute a full renovation of its building. Images of various areas of the building were shown.

In an effort to pursue the renovation of the building, proper funding is necessary. According to Ms. Brodsky, the original estimate of the project cost is approximately \$4,500,000. With that being said, the Library intends to apply for a state grant in the amount of \$2,250,000 and contributions from the Township of Chatham and the Borough of Chatham in the amount of \$750,000 each. The Library intends to contribute \$1,500,000 in addition to \$65,000 in pledges towards the renovation of the building. The library developed a strategic plan to address the renovation needs and to allow the community to benefit from the following proposals:

- Enclosed Collaborative Teen Space
- Enhanced Local History Room
- Add private study rooms
- Business center
- Combined STEAM/Meeting Rooms
- Improve lines of sight for easier navigation and safety concerns
- Enlargement of Community Room and ability to divide into two spaces
- Addition of Children's Activity Room
- Back entrance access ramp improvements
- Energy savings with a balanced HVAC system
- Cost avoidance on infrastructure repairs

• Waterproofing of the Library's basement

In response to Council Member Dempsey, Ms. Brodsky stated that the construction may take about 14 to 18 months; however, the Library will remain open. She further stated that the square footage of the building will not change. The ultimate goal is to maximize the existing usable space.

Ms. Brodsky and Mr. Hollander completed their presentation before the Mayor and Council.

Mayor Kobylarz proceeded to open the meeting to the public; however, prior to doing so, he delivered a portion of his Mayor's Report.

Mayor Kobylarz announced that the Borough has retained Robert Powell, a real estate financial advisor from Nassau Capital Advisors, LLC, for the proposed River Road Redevelopment Project. Mr. Powell started his financial examination of the redevelopment project and is scheduled to meet with the Governing Body on March 9, 2020 to discuss his findings. In the interim, the Borough continues to search for a real estate financial advisor and planner to provide alternative visions with respect to the Post Office Plaza Redevelopment Project. Lastly, the Borough will continue its search to retain a firm to manage a series of town hall meetings with regards to the redevelopment project. This includes other outreach efforts and a survey of the community.

Mayor Kobylarz proceeded to open the following to the public and read the following notice:

Hearing of citizens during the Public Comment section of the Agenda is an opportunity for any member of the public to be heard about issues which are/are not topics scheduled for Public Hearing tonight. To help facilitate an orderly meeting, and to permit all to be heard, speakers are asked to limit their comments to a reasonable length of time.

Rozella Clyde – 33 Carmine Street:

Ms. Clyde came forward and announced that the Green Team is coordinating with the Library of the Chathams to staff kiosks with respect to the 2020 Census. Notification of completing the Census online will be mailed to the public during the second week of March. However, for those without internet access or in need of assistance locating the website, can acquire help at the Library. Six (6) kiosks will be stationed at the Library with staffing available from March 17, 2020 through April 7, 2020, Monday-Friday from 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. Representative(s) from the Census will take over after April 7, 2020. Ms. Clyde requested volunteers to facilitate the public on accessing the Census online.

Fran Drew - 32 Inwood Road:

Ms. Drew proposed that the governing body install additional parking in the downtown area, filled with vegetation. She demonstrated a proposed green parking plan, known as the "green plan" consisting of green spaces as a passed proposal submitted to the Borough of Manasquan. She requested the governing body to use the "green plan" as inspiration for the Chatham Borough downtown area.

Stewart Carr - 3 Crestwood Drive, Chatham Township:

Mr. Carr commented on what Mrs. Drew stated concerning a proposed parking lot and requested a matrix to demonstrate the proposed cost of the parking project paid directly by the Borough versus the project paid by a developer. He also requested that alternative options be considered to ensure the public is aware of how the project works and its projected cost.

Ken Chmura – 6 Bartow Lane:

Mr. Chmura cautioned the governing body on the Spring Brook Apartment Complex interest to expand its parking lot. He stated the parking expansion will have a dramatic impact on Garden Park and could potentially impact the Garden Park trail.

ORDINANCE FOR SECOND READING

Mayor Kobylarz asked Council Member Weber to proceed with Ordinance #20-01.

Which Ordinance was introduced and passed on first reading at a regular Council meeting held on February 10, 2020.

Mayor Kobylarz asked the Borough Clerk to give a summary of the legal notice.

The Borough Clerk stated that a legal notice was published indicating that Ordinance #20-01 was introduced and passed on first reading at the February 10, 2020 meeting and indicated the second reading and public hearing would be held at 7:30 p.m. on February 24, 2020 for consideration of final adoption. Copies of this Ordinance were made available to the general public and posted in accordance with the law.

Mayor Kobylarz opened the public hearing on the Ordinance and invited any member of the public to be heard.

Seeing no one else wishing to be heard, Mayor Kobylarz closed the public hearing.

Council Member Weber offered the following Ordinance and move its adoption:

Mayor Kobylarz declared the Ordinance adopted and passed and requested the Borough Clerk to publish the proper notice of the adoption of this Ordinance in the official newspapers and to permanently record the Ordinance.

REPORTS

BOARD & COMMISSION MEMBERS & LIAISON REPORTS

Affordable Housing Advisory Committee - Council President Mathiasen informed the public that a Census will be mailed to everyone in March by the Federal Government. The Census is used to allocate billions of dollars of federal funding and helps to determine congressional representation. Participation can be done online, by phone or by completing the paper Census. She further encouraged the public to

take advantage of the kiosks to be stationed at the Library of the Chathams. The Census requires a headcount of every individual per household. She further advised everyone that the Census cannot share identifiable information. She urged everyone to participate.

Environmental Commission - Council President Mathiasen reported that the Commission has discussed the 50th Anniversary of Earth Day. More information will be available including multiple presentations. It was further reported that the plastic bag ban goes into effect on March 1, 2020. A mailing was sent to all relevant businesses in the Borough as a reminder and it included posters to inform patrons that plastic bags will not be provided, and there will be a \$.10 charge for a paper bag. However, customers are encouraged to bring their own bag. The Environmental Commission further discussed expanding the ban to include Styrofoam.

Communications & Technology Advisory Committee - Council President Mathiasen reported that the establishment of social media policy continues. She further clarified that the Bee Facebook page is not affiliated with the Borough. She further reported that Council Member Treloar created a model webpage for the Undergrounding Committee, which will be used as a model for all webpages for the Borough's Boards and Commissions to ensure consistency. Lastly, newsletters will be distributed every two months.

Board of Health - Council Member Weber reported that the Board met on February 13, 2020. The Board adopted new and revised ordinances, which are posted on the Borough's website. He brought attention to the passage of new vaping regulations. Borough Code, Chapter 308 was newly adopted and now requires vaping related businesses to be licensed by the Board of Health. This provision will include inspections of the vaping facility and prohibits licensed food establishments, liquor stores, bars and gas stations from selling vaping products. The new law further prohibits individuals under the age of 21 from entering and working in a vaping related business. Additionally, it prohibits the sale and distribution of any vaping related products to any person under the age of 21. New vaping businesses are prohibited within 500' of any schools, parks and other public recreation areas. There is a monetary penalty of \$50-\$2,000 for any violations of the new provisions.

9/11 Memorial Advisory Committee - Council Member Weber had nothing new to report.

Joint Recreation Advisory Committee - Council Member Weber reported that the Committee met on February 11, 2020 and appointed its new Chair, Peter McNally of Chatham Township. He further reported that the Chatham Athletic Foundation was disbanded due to little need for fundraising efforts and a lack of manpower.

Madison-Chatham Joint Meeting - Council Member Weber reported that the negotiation of the interest rates with New Jersey Infrastructure Bank concerning the pending improvement to the sewer plant is an ongoing matter.

Historic Riverside Trail Advisory Committee - Council Member Dempsey reported that the Committee is in the final stage of the Morris County Open Space Grant. The final part of the project is the implementation of kiosks throughout the trail at Shepard Kollock Park and along the Passaic River Trail. The kiosks will be installed in April and will commemorate the Borough's many historical facts. Additionally, a meeting will be held with the City of Summit to discuss constructing a bridge to connect the trail from Chatham Borough to the proposed trail in the City of Summit.

Historic Preservation Commission - Council Member Dempsey reported that the Historic Guidelines are complete, which will be a great resource for homeowners and businesses in the Historic District. The Committee is now taking nominations for the flag award for any notably refurbished or renovated structure. New members for the Commission are needed as two members stepped down.

Board of Education - Council Member Dempsey reported that the incoming kindergarten class registration numbers for next year remain approximately the same. The full-day kindergarten PILOT

program has been very successful and will continue at the Southern Boulevard School. Lastly, the School District has recently hired a new Athletic Director, Mo Abdelaziz.

Open Space & Historic Preservation Trust Advisory Committee - Council Member Dempsey had nothing new to report.

Public Arts Council Advisory Committee - Council Member Dempsey reported that the painting of the mural is ongoing. Additionally, it was reported that the draft license agreement for the Washington Avenue Mural was received from New Jersey Transit.

Chatham Borough Recreation Advisory Committee - Council Member Dempsey reported that Garden Avenue Park requires refurbishment as most of the amenities are dated. A survey was created and is being edited. The survey will be mailed out in the near future. The Committee seeks the public's input on what they prefer to see at the Garden Avenue Park. Lastly, the Municipal Pool is in search of a pool manager and a certified pool operator (CPO). The Borough may engage in a shared service agreement with the Township with respect to a CPO.

Shade Tree Commission - Council Member Koronkiewicz had nothing new to report.

Joint Community Gardens Advisory Committee - Council Member Koronkiewicz had nothing new to report.

Farmers' Market Advisory Committee - Council Member Koronkiewicz had nothing new to report.

Mayor's Wellness Advisory Committee - Council Member Koronkiewicz had nothing new to report.

MyChathamNJ Advisory Committee - Council Member Treloar reported that March 20, 2020 is International Day of Happiness. Town and Country Garden Club will be planting yellow pansies and local shop owners will greet customers with program specials that will last throughout the day. Additionally, Spring Cleanup will be held on May 2, 2020 from 8:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. The volunteers will be given reusable bags this year.

Planning Board - Council Member Treloar had nothing new to report.

Joint Municipal Court - Council Member Treloar had nothing new to report.

Project Community Pride - Council Member Resto stated that Project Community Pride exists for schools, parents and police officers to refer children that are experiencing emotional difficulties or behavioral issues. He stated that a recent report found an increase in depression and anxiety, especially among children ages 11-14 and ages15-18. He explained that emotional and behavioral problems being experienced by children correlates with conflicts within the household. He intends to meet with Lisa Sprague of Project Community Pride to discuss the report in more detail.

Pilgrim Pipeline Advisory Committee - Council Member Resto had nothing new to report.

Senior Center of the Chathams - Council Member Resto reported that a board meeting was held on February 8, 2020 and the members are planning their garden tour for the year. A donation of reusable bags was provided from Peapack Gladstone Bank for the seniors.

Municipal Alliance of the Chathams - Council Member Resto reported that the grant application was submitted.

Senior Citizens Advisory Committee - Council Member Resto reported that the Committee met on February 20, 2020 and the interest level remains high. In attendance were 31 volunteers. Additionally, three sub-committees were established: Communications, chaired by Tom Salvas, Physical Obstacles, chaired by Joan Thuebel and Seniors Companionship, to assist seniors that are homebound.

Traffic & Pedestrian Safety Advisory Committee - Council Member Resto reported that the

Committee's first meeting is scheduled tomorrow, February 25, 2020 at 7:00 p.m.

Undergrounding Advisory Committee - Council Member Resto reported that a representative from Jersey Central Power and Light may attend the Committees March 10th meeting. The Committee submitted questions to the company in hopes of a response. The Committee is also planning a symposium at Rutgers University on May 20, 2020 with various speakers and topics (e.g. climate change, underground).

Economic Development Advisory Committee - Council Member Resto reported that the Committee is scheduled to meet on February 26th.

MAYOR'S REPORT

Mayor Kobylarz reported that Wednesday is the inaugural meeting of the Economic Development Advisory Committee. It was created last year to advise of ways to establish and preserve a flourishing economic commercial sector within the Borough. The Committee will work diligently to address its priorities and to set up sub-committees to facilitate in the process and to ensure economic revitalization in the Borough. He acknowledged Council Liaisons, Council President Mathiasen and Council Member Resto who are both ready to work hard to successfully achieve the Committee's goals. Mayor Kobylarz envisioned the Committee elevating to a Commission status in the future.

ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT

Mr. Williams reported that the Curbside Brush Pickup is scheduled for March 16, 2020. It was further reported that a meeting was held with PSE&G with regards to their plan to replace electrical stanchions. PSEG will come before the Mayor and Council to report further on their plans. The gas replacement program continues in the Borough. Residents were encouraged to contact the PSE&G hotline to report any concerns. Lastly, the Morris County Freeholders will hold its regular meeting in Chatham Borough, in the Council Chambers on September 9, 2020.

Mayor Kobylarz stated that this meeting is a great opportunity for the governing body and residents to pose questions.

MAYORAL APPOINTMENT

WHEREAS, D'Onofrio & Son, Inc., located at 47 Van Ness Terrace, Maplewood, NJ 07040 was the lowest, responsible and responsive bidder, submitting a base bid in the amount the total amount of \$87,500 for a two-year contracting period; and

WHEREAS, the bid submission is in the proper form and in compliance with the bid specifications, as written, and in accordance with the provisions of <u>N.J.S.A.</u> 40A:11-23.1 and <u>N.J.S.A.</u> 40A:11-23.2; and

WHEREAS, the Borough Clerk has found the bid submission to be in compliance with the affirmative action laws and regulations of the State of New Jersey (<u>N.J.S.A.</u> 10:5-31 et seq and N.J.A.C. 17:27.) and with the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (42 <u>U.S.C.</u> S121 01 et seq.); and

WHEREAS, the award of the contract should be made to D'Onofrio & Son, Inc., 47 Van Ness Terrace, Maplewood, NJ 07040 in the amount of \$87,500 for a two-year contract period as per the bid specifications; and

WHEREAS, the Chief Financial Officer has certified that the maximum dollar amount of the contract shall not exceed \$87,500.00 for the two-year duration of the contract term (or \$43,750.00 for each twelve (12) consecutive months) and that funds are currently available for the purpose of awarding this contract from the following Current Fund Account 0-01-28-375-258.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR TO EXECUTE A MORRIS COUNTY TRAIL CONSTRUCTION GRANT PROGRAM AGREEMENT FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF THE GARDEN PARK PEDESTRIAN WALKING PATH

WHEREAS, the Borough of Chatham desires to submit a Morris County Trail Construction Grant Program application for the construction of the Garden Park Pedestrian Walking Path; and

WHEREAS, the Borough Engineer estimated the total project cost to be \$100,329.12; and

WHEREAS, the Borough is given three (3) years for the completion of the project, extending from March 31, 2020 to March 31, 2023;

WHEREAS, the Borough's Acting Chief Financial Officer must confirm that sufficient funds will be available in the 2020 Capital Budget submission for Borough Council approval to proceed with the project; and

WHEREAS, the Trail Construction Grant Application must be submitted to the Morris County Park Commission on or before March 2, 2020;

WHEREAS, KRE 500 is the owner of an existing multi-family apartment complex located at 534 Main Street, Block 33, Lot 5 on the Tax Map of the Borough of Chatham, also known as Springbrook at Chatham ("Springbrook"); and

WHEREAS, KRE 500 is in the process of proposing a Use/Density Variance and Amended Preliminary & Final Site Plan before the Zoning Board of Adjustment of the Borough of Chatham to permit the expansion of an existing off-street parking area that serves Springbrook, and to provide for stormwater management, relocation of a fire hydrant, plantings and lighting related to the apartment complex (the proposed "Use Variance and Site Plan Application"); and

WHEREAS, the Borough of Chatham is the owner of property adjacent to Springbrook, located at Block 33, Lot 16 on the Tax Map of the Borough of Chatham, also known as Garden Park ("Block 33, Lot 16"); and

WHEREAS, the Site Plan documents prepared by ABC Surveys, LLC on behalf of KRE 500 dated August 23, 2019 and revised January 27, 2020 ("Site Plan") have identified an existing encroachment onto Block 33, Lot 16 consisting of approximately 10 inches of curbing and paving associated with the parking area of the apartment complex ("Encroachment"); and

WHEREAS, the Site Plan shows the removal of the Encroachment as part of the Site Plan Application; and

WHEREAS, Steven Azzolini, Esq., the attorney for KRE 500, has also represented that the Encroachment will be removed as part of its proposed Use Variance and Site Plan Application; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Chatham wish to consent to KRE 500 including Block 33, Lot 16 as part of its Use Variance and Site Plan Application in order to allow for the removal of the Encroachment; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Borough Council of the Borough of Chatham, County of Morris, State of New Jersey that the Mayor of the Borough of Chatham is hereby authorized to execute a consent with KRE 500 to include Block 33, Lot 16 as part of KRE 500's proposed Use Variance and Site Plan Application to the Zoning Board of Adjustment of the Borough of Chatham in order to allow KRE 500 to remove the existing Encroachment onto Borough property at Garden Park; and
